



Figure 2. Test circuit, saturated operation




Figure 4. Total Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 5. Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Figure 6. Relative Current Transfer Ratio vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 7. Collector Dark Current vs. Ambient Temperature






Figure 8. Collector Current vs. Forward Current




Figure 9. Collector Current vs. Collector Emitter Voltage




Figure 10. Collector Emitter Saturation Voltage vs. Collector Current




Figure 11. Current Transfer Ratio vs. Forward Current




Figure 12. Turn on / off Time vs. Forward Current






Figure 13. Turn on / off Time vs. Collector Current



### **Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement**

It is the policy of Vishay Semiconductor GmbH to

- 1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.
- 2. Regularly and continuously improve the performance of our products, processes, distribution and operatingsystems with respect to their impact on the health and safety of our employees and the public, as well as their impact on the environment.

It is particular concern to control or eliminate releases of those substances into the atmosphere which are known as ozone depleting substances (ODSs).
